APS-IUSSTF PHYSICS STUDENT & POST-DOC VISITATION PROGRAM

DEADLINE: 1 NOVEMBER 2013

Proposal Guidelines

The Indo-U.S. Science and Technology Forum (IUSSTF) and the American Physical Society (APS) are pleased to support the APS-IUSSTF Physics Student and Post-doc Visitation Program. The awards are sponsored by IUSSTF and are administered through APS. Details of the program, along with proposal guidelines are laid out below.

APS-IUSSTF PHYSICS STUDENT & POST-DOC VISITATION PROGRAM

A. Overview

The United States already enjoys hosting many graduate students and post-docs from India who gain a greater understanding of U.S. culture, people, as well as academics. On the other hand, while India is rapidly growing both economically and scientifically, far fewer U.S. students and post-docs will gain similar first-hand experience with Indian science, culture, and people. Given this current disparity, the APS-IUSSTF program might support more travel to India by U.S. graduate students and post-docs, while still enabling Indian students to travel to the United States.

A call for proposals is issued bi-annually. Applicants will develop a proposal for travel funds in partnership with an Indian or U.S. host—presumably a professor with whom their visit would be coordinated. The students and post-docs may apply for travel funds to pursue a breadth of opportunities in physics. A review committee comprised of APS and IUSSTF-appointed representatives will review each proposal for its merits.

B. Program Characteristics

Visitations may include travel to:

- Attend a short-course, or summer institute;
- Visit with a professor in his/her field of study;
- Work temporarily in a laboratory; or
- Undertake another opportunity that the applicant and host believe is worthy of travel support.

Proposals must be submitted by students or post-docs in coordination with a professor from the host institution. Recipients will be selected by a joint APS-IUSSTF Review

Committee, with deadlines for proposals twice each year. Up to ten awardees will be selected each year.

Awards will be in the amount of \$3,000; larger sums can be awarded upon demonstration of need. Please note any special financial requirements in the application. Awards may be used for travel, materials, and expenses associated with the visitation as agreed upon by the APS and the IUSSTF, in consultation with the host institution.

C. Proposal Guidelines & Procedures

The application deadline is Friday, 1 November 2013. Applicants must submit a joint proposal with their advisor (in the case of graduate students) or supervisor (in the case of post-docs) and the hosting professor/advisor at the host institution. Proposals must include:

1. A joint proposal (1-2 pages) from the applicant, his/her advisor (in the case of students) or supervisor (in the case of post-docs), and the host professor at the host institution. The proposal must include a general overview, objectives, and anticipated outcomes of the visit.
2. Letters of support for the proposal from the applicant's advisor or supervisor as well as the host.
3. A schedule of activities for the duration of the visit.
4. A budget for requested funds. (Items 3 and 4 should be no more than two pages total.)
5. A brief, current curriculum vitae for both the student or post-doc and the hosting professor (maximum of two pages for each c.v.).

Indian applicants must be affiliated with and attending an Indian institution at the time of application. U.S. applicants must be affiliated with and attending a U.S. institution at the time of application.

D. Grants

APS manages the disbursement of funds. Grantees will submit receipts to APS. If requested, APS would consider advancing the student the airfare. The remainder of the funds will be reimbursed to the awardees upon the successful completion of the visit. All visits must be completed within 1 year of the award date. Grantees must submit a final report within 60 days of their return.

E. Award Priorities

The program recognizes that many graduate students may use their physics education in careers other than scientific research. Consequently, along with the scientific merit of the proposal, the awards will also be based on criterion beyond scientific merit. Strong consideration will be given to applicants whose proposals demonstrate how this cultural and scientific exchange opportunity will impact future career directions, especially in building leadership skills. In keeping with the desire to create new linkages between U.S.

and Indian institutions, the program will favor candidates who have had no prior experience in the other country.
