## A Brief History of the Committee on the Status of Women of the APS

At the February 1971 NY APS meeting, Prof. Vera Kistiakowsky of MIT requested the APS Council to create a Committee on Women in Physics. The first 15-member Committee was established by the Council on April 25, 1971. The first Chair was Professor Kistiakowsky. The Committee was awarded a grant of \$10,000 from the Sloan Foundation to support its work, particular the data acquisition and analysis. That first Committee formed six working groups: data on colleges, data on government and national laboratories, data on industry, data on universities, recommendations, and a roster of women in physics. The roster, compiled by Professor Kistiakowsky and Gloria B. Lubkin, Senior Editor for Physics Today, was later published by APS.

In 1971 Professor Kistiakowsky retired from the Chair of the Committee on Women. The newly convened Committee, under the chairmanship of Elizabeth Urey Baranger, was renamed the Committee on the Status of Women in Physics. The Committee retains that name to this date.

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The following is a brief history of COSWIP prepared in 1977 by the 1976 Chair, Nancy M. O'Fallon, and the 1977 Chair, Caroline L. Herzenberg.

# National Research Opportunity Grants and Visiting Professorships Program

Approved under the Equal Opportunities in Science Provision of the National Science Foundation Authorization legislation

The National Science Foundation Board has approved National Research Opportunity Grants and the Visiting Professorships Program under the Equal Opportunities in Science Provision of the National Science Foundation bill.

### National Research Opportunity Grants

These grants are available to women who are within five years of having received a doctorate, or to those who have received a doctorate, had their careers interrupted, and who are re-entering the professions within five years of the interruption. These grants will be used to support research in a woman scientist's area of expertise and are for a maximum of three years. Details of the form of grant application should be available shortly, but we expect the form will be similar to the regular NSF grant procedure. To receive funding by October 1981, the suggested deadline for application is April 15. Anyone interested in applying should write immediately to

### Visiting Professorships Program

The second program approved under the Equal Opportunities in Science Provision is a Visiting Professorships Program under which women scientists will serve as role models of women in science at institutions of higher education. This program is for women with the Ph.D or equivalent experience who will teach on a full- or part-time

basis for a period of usually one year but potentially up to two years. The institution which hosts a Visiting Professor must undertake the application for consideration in the program, but interested members may initiate contacts with specific institutions to make them aware of their interest in being invited. Those wishing to participate in the Visiting Professorships Program may write to AWIS; if we hear of institutions looking for women scientists to host, we will get in touch with you.

The Equal Opportunities in Science Provision of the NSF authorization bill grew in part from the Women in Science provisions which were under consideration earlier. The present provisions include both women and minorities and are considerably more general than earlier versions. There are no longer plans for creating the office of Special Assistant to the Director on Women in Science and for Special Assistant to the Director on Minorities, but there will be an Advisory Committee including a significant number of women and minorities.

Among the types of programs which can be authorized under the present provisions are the following: programs for encouraging women to enter the sciences at all educational levels and helping in their support; improving public understanding of women in science; providing traineeships and fellowships for women in science; encouraging the employment and advancement of women scientists.

While the only programs authorized as yet are the National Research Opportunity Grants and the Visiting Professorships Program, we believe there is scope under the law for additional projects; we would like to hear your ideas so that we can make suggestions and recommendations which reflect the needs of the AWIS membership.

The text of the authorization bill containing the Equal Opportunities in Science Provisions and the Statement of Managers with respect to the intent of the bill appear in the Congressional Record of November 21, 1980, pages H-11131 to H-11138. The Congressional Record is available from any library.

A national conference on "Women in the Professions: Science, Social Science and Engineering" will be held at Purdue University on March 20-21, 1981. The major objectives of the conference—the first to focus on these three areas to held in the Mid-West—are to review opportunities for women, assess the current status of professional

women, identify factors affecting their success and generate methods for increasing the visibility and influence of professional women.
